

## **BCI Sabbatical Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)**

- 1. Do I really have to live full time on the island? Yes. The successful applicant must reside on the island at least five days per week.
- 2. Can I apply to live on BCI with my family? Yes, family members may be accommodated. However, having children on BCI involves logistical challenges and additional costs that are not covered by STRI.
- 3. Are children allowed on the island? Children are welcome under certain conditions, but due to the remote and research-focused nature of the island, accommodations and activities for children are limited.
- 4. Is there a school? No, but the internet is strong enough that homeschooling is an option.
- 5. **Is day-care service provided?** No, but it is possible to hire a dedicated childcare provider. STRI will not cover this expense. BCI presents many hazards, so children under 12 require a full-time caregiver.
- 6. Will STRI pay for my airfare and other relocation expenses? No.
- 7. Will STRI provide insurance? Neither accident nor healthcare insurance will be provided by STRI for the incumbent or their family members. STRI's Human Resources office can offer information on local insurance providers for self-enrollment. One commonly used option among long-term fellows is PALIG, which offers the same coverage and rates as the plan available to STRI employees.
- 8. What visitor category am I? The participant will be required to register a project and a visit with the Visitor Services Office (VSO). The candidate will fall under category A4 (Special appointment made by the Director's Office). Most STRI-associated fees will be waived. A full list of fees and can be found here.
- 9. Who is eligible to apply? Researchers, academics, and professionals in tropical biology or related fields (e.g., ecology, conservation, evolutionary biology, paleontology, archaeology) are encouraged to apply. Applicants should have a demonstrated research background and a clear plan for how the sabbatical will advance their work.
- 10. What is the duration of the sabbatical? A minimum commitment of six months is preferred.
- 11. What support is provided? On-island housing and meals and access to shared laboratory space. The incumbent may request a small multi-purpose space suitable as a lab and office for the duration of their time on BCI. Additionally, the incumbent will have access to STRI's research infrastructure and long-term datasets, as well as logistical support.
- 12. **Is funding available?** While the program provides housing and research access, applicants are encouraged to seek external funding for travel, equipment, and personal expenses.
- 13. Can I bring collaborators or students? Collaborators may be considered on a case-by-case basis. Please include details in your proposal. Student involvement is possible but must align with STRI's guidelines and housing capacity.
- 14. What kind of research is suitable for BCI? Barro Colorado Island is ideal for field-based studies in tropical ecology, biodiversity, species interactions, forest dynamics, and long-term ecological monitoring. Projects that leverage existing datasets or contribute to ongoing research themes are especially welcome.
- 15. What are the living conditions like on the island? BCI offers basic but comfortable accommodations, communal dining, and shared research facilities. The environment is remote and peaceful, ideal for focused work and immersion in nature.



- 16. What is the deadline? The deadline for submission is December 1, 2025, and applicants will be notified by February 2026.
- 17. Is the island accessible year-round? Yes, Barro Colorado Island operates year-round.
- 18. Is there medical support available on the island? Basic first aid is available, but for medical care, researchers typically travel to Panama City. BCI Station residents are expected to bring all their own medications, both prescription and non-prescription, as STRI cannot provide any medications.
- 19. Are there opportunities to engage with local communities or students? Yes, STRI encourages outreach and collaboration. Researchers may participate in educational programs or coordinate with local institutions, depending on the nature of their work.
- 20. How frequently does STRI provide a bus between the dock in Gamboa and the city? Four days per week (M,T,Th,F).
